





HYBRID WILDERNESS FIRST RESPONDER RECERTIFICATION COURSES

March 2-3 April 6-7 May 4-5 November 23-24

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Are your wilderness medicine protocols on the tip of your tongue or in the bottom of your pack? Join the leader in wilderness medicine for a two-day scenario-based course to review evacuation and decision-making guidelines. Our dynamic, experienced instructors will refresh you on current techniques, protocols and controversies in the wilderness medicine field. You will have opportunities to ask questions and to participate in challenging practical scenarios. The Wilderness First Responder Recertification (WFR Recertification) course includes adult and child CPR training. Upon successful completion of the course, you'll earn the following NOLS Wilderness Medicine certifications: Wilderness First Responder/Wilderness EMT (dependent on current certification), Adult and Child CPR & Airway Management, and Epinephrine Auto-injector.

This course is the most popular recertification program in wilderness medicine and is ideal for current Wilderness First Responders and Wilderness EMTs.

CLASS FORMAT AND PERSONAL PREPAREDNESS

This newly formatted Hybrid WFR Recertification course includes an online component. Upon registering, you will receive an email with further information. Three weeks prior to the start of the course you will receive an email with links to online materials (readings and videos) and the written WFR Recertification test. You must complete all online component prior to arriving at the course site. Please note that these online resources are different from the review materials available on the NOLS Wilderness Medicine website.

Check in is at 7:45 AM on the first day of the course. Day 1 will run from 8:00AM – 5:00PM, with CPR that evening from 5:30PM – 8:00PM. Day 2 will run from 8:00AM – 5:00PM. The course consists of demonstrations, a few short lectures, skills practice sessions, and many practical scenarios. Scenarios and practice sessions will take place both inside and outside. The weather in northern Arizona can be unpredictable and varies with the season. Bring outdoor clothing appropriate for lying on the potentially wet, muddy, or frozen ground playing the role of both rescuer and patient. Frequently, stage (moulage) blood and make-up will be used to emphasize the reality of a scenario. Generally, the classroom environment lends itself to a pair of comfy shoes/slippers and a Crazy Creek-type chair

RECERTIFICATION REQUIREMENTS

NOLS Wilderness Medicine graduates

NOLS Wilderness Medicine certified students should bring their certification cards to the course so that the instructor can verify the expiration date. NOLS Wilderness Medicine certification holders will be afforded a one-year period after expiration within which to recertify. This one-year re-entry period is only offered for NOLS Wilderness Medicine certifications.

Graduates from other wilderness medicine providers

NOLS Wilderness Medicine welcomes eligible graduates from other providers to recertify on our Wilderness First Responder Recertification course or our Hybrid Wilderness First Responder Recertification course. To be eligible for recertification you must possess a current (unexpired) WAFA certification, WFR certification from a provider whose WFR course is a minimum of 70 hours, or WEMT certification.

There is no re-entry period once your certification expires. It is your responsibility to make sure your certification meets this standard. If you are unsure, please contact FFI to verify your certification qualifies before enrolling in a course.

Students certified by other wilderness medicine providers are required to submit a photocopy of their unexpired certification card on the first day of the course. We cannot issue you a new card until we have verified your previous training.

Wilderness EMTs

Students recertifying the wilderness portion of their WEMT certification must submit a photocopy of their current state or NREMT EMT card on course.

Verification of knowledge and skills

Students must pass the written exam online prior to the course, and students must demonstrate adequate practical skills during the course to pass the course and obtain recertification from NOLS Wilderness Medicine. As part of the online portion of the course, you will watch videos of the patient assessment and focused spine assessment. Please practice some assessments prior to the course. You'll enjoy the course far more if you are adequately prepared.

REGISTRATION

Course tuition is \$330, and payment in full is required to reserve a spot in the course. The tuition fee covers instruction, textbooks, equipment, and certification cards. Enroll on the NOLS website using these links:

CANCELLATION AND REFUND POLICY

If a student cancels or withdraws from the course

- Greater than or equal to 30 days prior to the course starting date, Flagstaff Field Institute will retain a \$50 administrative fee. All other funds will be returned.

Bring the two-page signed document to the first day of the course. If you are a minor, a parent or guardian must sign the document as well. Without a signed document, you cannot participate in the course. NOLS Wilderness Medicine participants, including minors, will have unsupervised free time throughout the course. Any activities during the free time are not part of NOLS Wilderness Medicine program and are at the sole risk of the participant.

CONTINUING EDUCATION AND COLLEGE CREDIT

EMT continuing education

NOLS Wilderness Medicine is proud to be a Commission on Accreditation of Pre-Hospital Continuing Education (CAPCE) accredited organization. Current EMTs are eligible to receive 18 CEU hours at no additional cost for participation in a WFR Recertification course.

College credit

The Hybrid WFR Recertification course is pre-approved for one semester hour credit through Western State Colorado University (WSCU) for an additional cost of \$80. Thirty days **prior** to the NOLS Wilderness Medicine course, interested students must initiate registration and payment for credit by requesting an enrollment form for WSCU from NOLS Wilderness Medicine.

TRAVEL DIRECTIONS

The courses will be held at Highlands Fire Department station 23. The combination of an outstanding classroom facility and undeveloped outdoor space for scenarios and mock rescues make this an ideal location for a wilderness medicine course.
